They control the urge to use the toilet till they reach home," she said. "We know that holding back is bad for health but what else can they do?" She says she advises her children to use the toilets early, when few children have used them, rather than later in the day because they are cleaned only once daily,

INTERPRETATIONS

The study reveals that female students have better toilet etiquette than male students. This may be due to the emphasis given to female members of the family to take care of the cleanliness of toilet at home as part of their domestic chores.

QUESTION-WISE ANALYSIS

Some of the interesting findings of the few question-wise analysis are:

- 57% of male and 48% of the female students' are having fear washing their feet after using the toilet to avoid damage to our expensive footwear.
- 52% of male students' say that they will urinate in places other than toilets (public places).
- 48% of students' say that they do not take efforts to stop the water leakages in the toilet.
- 45% of the female students' says that they do not know to operate the napkin dispensary machine in the toilet.
- 15% of the students' say that they enjoy talking inside the toilet with their friends.

EDUCATIONAL IMPLICATIONS

- Short films can be screened to the students regarding toilet cleanliness
- Efforts must be taken to cultivate toilet etiquette among the students
- Teaching toilet etiquette at schools and colleges
- Assigning a project to clean their toilets at home
- Crash courses can be conducted on 'How to use the toilets'
- To conduct awareness programs on the threats of using unhygienic toilets
- Sanitation club should be organized in schools and college to facilitate the toilet hygiene
- Government sanitary inspector should regularly visit the school and college toilets
- The school and college management should take efforts to fulfil adequate toilet facilities to the students and frequent water facilities to the toilet
- The management should appoint enough workers to maintain cleanliness of the toilets
- Health programs should be conduct exclusively for girls and female students on 'how to operate the napkin dispensary machine'.
