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ACADEMY AWARD FOR BEST INTERNATIONAL FEATURE FILM: A REVIEW

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Abstract

This study attempts to understand the nature and criterion for academy award given in the best international feature film category (Before 2020, it was known as Best Foreign Language Film) to the feature-length motion picture with the non-English dialogue track produced outside the United States. Earlier between 1947 to 1955, this award was given as a Special/Honorary Award to only one selected foreign film which was released in the United States. After 1956, nominations were invited and awards were given to the winning film. Italy and France have won the maximum number of Oscars in this category with a maximum number of nominations. To win an academy award, a country can only submit only one film to the academy and for that, some eligibility and submission criteria are fixed by the academy of motion picture arts and sciences which has also been discussed in this paper and this paper. Data from various secondary sources have been used in this research. This paper also includes a table with concise details of the country-wise list explaining the country's submission years, total submitted total submitted films, and nominated and winning films.

INTRODUCTION

The Academy Awards, popularly known as Oscars, are a famous and prestigious award that acknowledges individuals with creative and technical achievements in the film industry. The award plays a significant role in the winner's career, as he or she receives better work offers, increases in income, and media recognition. It is presented annually by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences based in Beverly Hills, California, US.¹ It is a professional honorary organization with membership by invitation only, granted by its Board of Governors to notable contributors to motion picture arts and sciences.² The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences (AMPAS) was established on May 4, 1927, as a combination of a union and a marketing organization, an idea driven by Louis B. Mayer of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer (MGM).³

The state approved the Academy's establishment as a non-profit organization in early May 1927. A week later, on May 11, 1927, the Biltmore Hotel hosted an official organizational luncheon. It was attended by 300 visitors, 230 of whom joined the Academy for a fee of \$100 apiece. The Academy also awarded its first honorary membership to Thomas Edison that night. At first, just five award categories were established: producers, actors, directors, writers, and technicians. The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences (AMPAS) was founded as a result of this. On May 16, 1929, the first Academy Awards were formally awarded at a black-tie ceremony. The Academy Award for Best International Feature Film (known as Best Foreign Language Film before 2020) is one of the

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Academy Awards presented annually by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. It is given to a feature-length motion picture made outside of the United States including a mostly non-English dialogue track.⁵

OBJECTIVES

- To study the academy award for the best international feature film.
- To study the history of the best international feature film category.
- To study the eligibility criteria for the best international feature film category.
- To study the winners and nominations of the best international feature films.

METHODOLOGY

- Case study method has been adopted in this research. Case study is an in-depth examination of a social unit of society, such as a person, family, institution, community, or event. It gives complete attention to one particular unit.
- The study uses secondary data from various sources.

HISTORY

In July 1928, The Academy initially invited Award submissions in twelve categories from 1 August 1927 to 31 July 1928. The first award ceremony was held on May 16, 1929, to recognize the cinema industry's outstanding achievements from 1927 to 1928.6 The event was held at a private dinner at the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel in Los Angeles, California. Douglas Fairbanks, the AMPAS president, hosted the event.7 The chosen people received a total of 15 prizes for their achievements in different areas of filmmaking. Three months ago, the winners of the first event were announced.6 When the inaugural Academy Awards ceremony was held on May 16, 1929, to celebrate films made in 1927/28, there was no special category for foreign language films because the majority of the films released in 1927 and 1928 were silent films. Between 1947 and 1955, the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences presented Special/Honorary Awards to the finest foreign language films released in the United States. However, these awards were not given regularly, and they were not competitive because there were no nominees and just one winning film every year.

For the first time, the Academy Award for Best Foreign-Language Film was presented in 1956. (Federico Fellini's *La Strada* won over four other films.) It's remained a staple of the event ever since, with minor adjustments. Winners are selected in the same manner as any other category, with Academy members watching the films and voting on their favorites.⁸ Unlike other Academy Awards, the International Feature Film award is not given to a specific person (though it is acknowledged on stage by the film's director), but rather to the country that submitted the film.⁵

ELIGIBILITY AND SUBMISSION CRITERIA

A feature-length motion picture (over 40 minutes) produced outside the United States of America and its territories with a mostly (more than 50%) non-English dialogue track is considered an international film. The original dialogue track, as well as the final film, must be recorded mostly (more than 50%) in a language or languages other than English. Subtitles in English must be accurate and legible.⁹

Before 2006, a country's submission required to be in one of the country's official languages. This restriction has been repealed, allowing filmmakers to make films in languages that are not native to



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the country in which the film is made. As a result, primarily English-speaking countries like the United Kingdom, Australia, and Ireland have been able to enter films in a variety of languages.¹⁰

The country-selected film must be first publicly exhibited for at least seven consecutive days in a commercial motion picture theatre for the benefit of the producer and exhibitor no earlier than January 1, 2022, and no later than November 30, 2022. Submissions must be in 35mm or 70mm film, or a 24- or 48-frame progressive scan Digital Cinema format with a minimum projector resolution of 2048 by 1080 pixels.

During its qualifying theatrical release, the film must be marketed and exploited in a manner considered regular and customary to theatrical feature distribution procedures. The picture was not authorized to be released in the United States.

The submitting country must confirm that the majority of creative control over the film was maintained by citizens or residents of the submitting country.

A film shall be declared disqualified if a selection committee fails to reveal current and/or accurate information about its citizenship, business-related affiliation or credit on a selected film, designated credits, production details, and release information.

Each country will be invited to send the Academy its best film. The film will be chosen by a single approved organization, jury, or committee consisting of artists and/or craftspeople from the area of motion pictures. A list of the selection committee members must be submitted to the Academy by its advertised submission date.

As the official selection, only one film from each country will be approved. When a film is chosen, it should be submitted to the Academy as soon as possible.⁹

VOTING

Nominations for International Feature Films will be determined in two rounds of voting:

- a. The International Feature Film Preliminary Committee will review the category's qualifying applications and vote by secret ballot to create a shortlist of fifteen films.
- b. To choose the category's five nominees, the International Feature Film Nominating Committee must watch the fifteen shortlisted films and vote by secret ballot.

The International Feature Film award will be decided by active and life Academy members who have seen all five nominated films.

The Academy statuette (Oscar) will be awarded to the film and accepted on behalf of the picture's creative talents by the director. The country will be recognized as a nominee for the Academy Awards. The director's name will appear after the country and film title on the statuette plaque.⁹

DOMINANCE OF EUROPE AND OTHER WINNERS

This has undoubtedly been dominated by European films, with Italy winning 11 Oscars, followed by France with 9 as the two most successful countries. These two countries have contributed to Europe winning 80% of the awards, with the Americas winning 8% and Africa contributing 5% of the winning films. After winning '*Parasite*' the Best Foreign Language Film, Asia has now tied the Americas with 5 victories. Beginning with Asia's first award-winning film, *Crouching Tiger*, *Hidden*



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Dragon, in 2000, a new trend emerges. In the last twenty years, non-European winners have made up half of the winners, with Parasite confirming this remarkable level of diversity in this category. International films may qualify for Best Picture. In 2020, Bong Joon-ho's film Parasite became the first non-English film to win Best Picture at the Oscars. There have been thirteen non-English films nominated for Best Picture in the history of Academy Awards: Grand Illusion (1937, France); Z (1969, France); The Emigrants (1971, Sweden); Cries and Whispers (1972, Sweden); Il Postino: The Postman (1994, Italy); Life is Beautiful (1997, Italy); Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon (2000, China); Letters from Iwo Jima (2006, Japan); Amour (2012, Austria, France, Germany); Roma (2018, Mexico); Parasite (2019, South Korea); Minari (2020, United States); Drive My Car (2021, Japan).

CONCLUSION

The study concludes that in this category, Italy has the maximum number of winning and nominations followed by France. These two countries are the most successful in this category and then followed by Japan, Spain, Sweden, and Denmark. Somewhere we got to see the dominance of European films in this category with a maximum number of wins and nominations. In Asia, Japan is the only country with the highest wins and nominations The country has to fulfill all the rules and regulations and eligibility criteria to survive in this category. Countries like Tanzania, Syria, Suriname, Sudan, and others have not performed well and they have submitted their films only one time to the academy. A country like India, which produces the maximum number of films in the world has also had poor performance in this category with 54 submissions and only 3 nominations. Bong Joon-ho's film *Parasite* creates the history and became the first non-English film to win Best Picture at the Oscars in 2020 and the first South Korean film to win Best International Feature Film Award.

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
